<p>Greetings, introductions, and updates (Penny)</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none">• Welcome and introductions• Tim Kaplan has agreed to move into the role as chair beginning July 2023 <p>Student Experience (Dan)</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none">• Positive feeling on campus this term Hitting on all cylinders right now – OSU Assist has launched, increased Mental Health response, new Housing vision, new child care centers, new ways to meet basic needs of students <p>Student Engagement Trends and Updates</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none">• OSU Assist (Kevin) 2 years of work (October 2020) to the launch (September 2022) Hired 3 crisis responders led by one coordinator Engagement being done around awareness of this program Article in the Chronicle of Higher Education• Greek Life (Kevin) Panhellenic 500 students recruited; about half of them have found homes Greek BBQ this fall – very large turnout National Panhellenic council recently met – about 40 attendees• Housing (Stephen) Incredibly high demand for housing this fall; welcomed 5000 students! 60 residents placed in short term housing; number now reduced to 20 Expect to transition everyone to permanent housing in next 3 weeks Even with demand, able to keep 10 rooms for emergency housing needs High demand remains for Nia & munk-skukum living learning communities Residential students are engaged; events are well attended Conduct numbers are trending downward Still staffing challenges, especially in Dining – not specific or unique to OSU Developing new housing vision – planning for next 10-15 years Working closely with Enrollment Management Strategy Committee as well	<p>Penny Atkins Dan Larson Kevin Dougherty Stephen Jenkins</p>
<p>Office of International Services PowerPoint presentation</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none">• Supports incoming international students & scholars, study abroad opportunities, intercultural experiences, and internationalization initiatives across campus• 2021 – international students made up 7.6% of student population; INTO OSU has increased recruitment numbers of international students• INTO is a global partner with over 20 university partners	<p>Grace Atebe</p>

<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Leading sending countries are China, India, Taiwan • Engineering & Business are the leading majors where international students are studying at OSU • Support services – getting here, staying here, exploring here, working here • Prearrival orientation, orientation upon arrival, immigration processes and status, understand resources – academic advising & requirements for immigration status • Cultural Exchange experiences here – Global Buddies (pairs domestic and international students); International Friendship Program – partner with Multicultural Program – community members volunteer to help welcome international students – pairing process • Work prep – work closely with CDC to help prepare students for post-graduation (1-year practicum training here in the US; STEM fields up to 3 years) critical for students to have work experience in US; provide assist with application process, etc. • Potential to grow numbers of students taking advantage of OPT – Optional Practicum Training 	
<p>Career Development – Beyond OSU PowerPoint presentation</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Main goal is to make career development an integrated part to everyone’s college experience • Career is the #1 reasons why students are pursuing a degree, especially as people question the value of higher education • Need to do a better job of connecting skills that transfer to careers • Faculty Senate recently passed Bacc Core curriculum reform; OSU nation-wide leaders among universities of same size 	Brandi Fuhrman
<p>Student Mental Health Resources & Updates PowerPoint presentation</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Talked about national mental Health Climate • Anxiety increasing more than depression; pandemic has been an accelerant • Has not had as much of a physical impact on young adults, but mental health • Spoke with triage counselors yesterday – lot of lonely students, disconnected, struggling with social skills to make connections/friends; social media perfect look • Increasing needs, decreasing staff • CAPS currently has 30 staff (20 counselors, 7 or 8 trainees, mental health promotion staff) • Funding source is student fees (not voted on by student government) • Wait-time for students depends on need; triage counselor (few days to 2 weeks to see triage counselor) and then student chooses next steps (could take as long as a month) • Expanded menu of services • Anytime Anywhere: MySSP@OSU – not only a crisis line; can talk to someone – can also request ongoing counseling services 	Ian Kellems
